From the Executive Director

For Aurora, 2009 was a year filled with many storms, but also with many celebrated accomplishments.

The year got off to a wonderful beginning with the addition of a case manager to the New Start Program in January. But storms began to brew when a mid-June fire at the office was followed two weeks later with property damages incurred when a delivery truck hit the building. Then, two weeks later, as a staff member was taking a client to an appointment, our car was hit from behind. Mercifully, no one was injured in any of these incidents, and Aurora weathered the storms of paperwork, estimates and repairs.

The Federal Stimulus Package included funding for the prevention of homelessness, and our board of directors agreed for Aurora to take the lead in managing this important program. In July we initiated planning to bring the Homeless Prevention Rapid Re-housing Program to our community, and in September, we celebrated addition of the seven new staff members who are helping area individuals and families remain housed during their own economic storms. They increased our total staff to 22, and we added two additional locations to accommodate our growing staff needs. Having resources available to actually prevent homelessness was cause for celebration as we reflected on the opportunity this brings to our clients and our community.

In December, we celebrated the accomplishments of the five years since the launch of *Destination Home: A Ten-Year Plan to End Homelessness in Evansville and Vanderburgh County*. The following week we mourned the seven individuals that died throughout the year at our community memorial service, and were reminded of the importance of the journey we're on toward our destination of a safe and affordable home for all of our residents.

And just before year's end, we took a wonderful stride forward in that journey thanks to a \$ 250,000 challenge donation given by the Kempf family for the development of supportive housing.

Storms to weather and accomplishments to celebrate – both are part of the lifecycle in a non-profit.

Thanks to your support as donors, volunteers and partners, Aurora and our staff have grown through our storms and we have built the foundation we believe will lead to many more accomplishments to celebrate in 2010 and the years to come.

Chronically Homeless Person

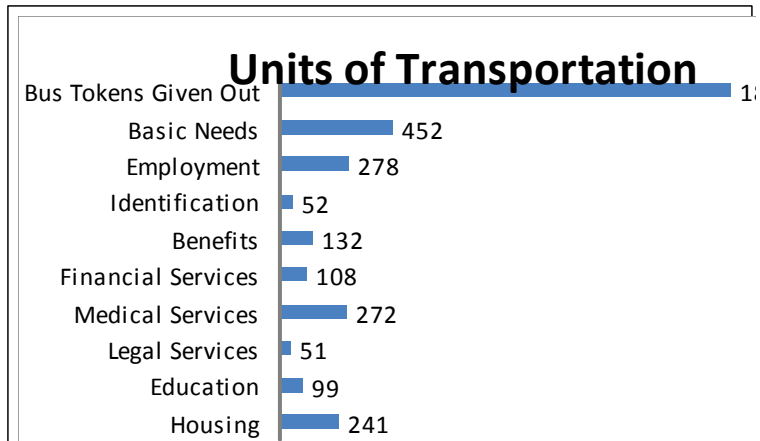
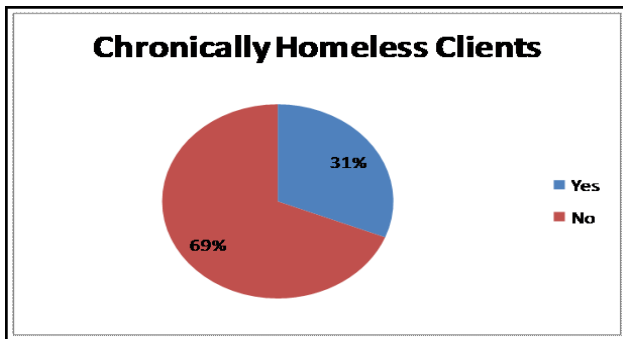

To be considered chronically homeless a person must have been on the streets or in an emergency shelter during these stays.

All Clients— Profile

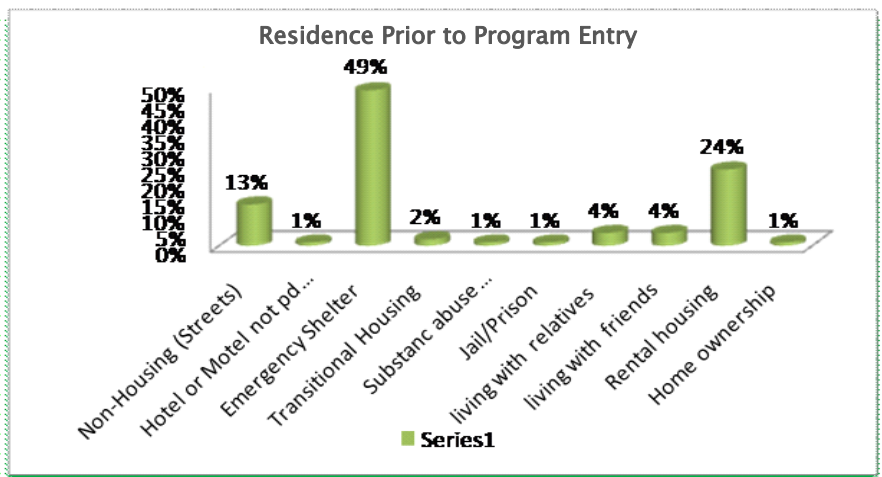
- 133 exits from case management in 2009

2009 Outreach Team Client Profile

- Served 156 cases in 2009.
- 75% of the exited outreach clients went to permanent housing.
- 87% of the exited outreach clients raised their social support scores on our assessment tool.
- 63% of outreach clients exited the program after increasing their income.
- 62% of the clients were Male
- 38% of the clients were Female
- 12% of our Clients were U.S. Veterans
- 10% of the clients served had been served by our agency previously.

Program Spotlight—Homeless Prevention Rapid Re-housing Program

2009 provided a remarkable opportunity for the community with the release of new HUD funding called Homeless Prevention Rapid Re-housing Program (HPRP). With the help of the Prevention Committee of the Commission on Homelessness and an implementation team from the Homeless Services Council, a complementary program was designed to serve households at risk of becoming homeless and to move currently homeless families and individuals out of homelessness quickly. Aurora was selected to be the program sponsor for the three year funding cycle. This program fits with many of the prevention strategies outlined in *Destination:: Home*.

The program added a total of seven new positions: 4 case managers to work directly with clients, 1 housing broker, 1 bookkeeper, and 1 Prevention Coalition Coordinator.

In addition to working directly with clients, the Prevention Coalition Coordinator is working at a community level to create a community wide prevention system to prevent homelessness from occurring in the first place. It is much more cost effective to keep families in existing housing than to fund the costs of shelter, re-housing and the trauma of homelessness.

This program continues Aurora's philosophy of developing comprehensive solutions targeted to work one-on-one with individuals while working to create systemic change.

Homeless Prevention: Tenant Education

Aurora's tenant education curriculum helps participants maximize their role as tenants (understanding leases, relating to landlords, managing resources and crises).

Our Community Liaison, Sr. Mary Ann Woodward, conducts a class for Aurora's outreach clients. United Caring Shelters hosts the class. Outreach Ministries partners by assisting those who complete the class with financial assistance for housing costs.

During 2009, Sr. Mary Ann also provided hourly sessions of tenant education to the residents of Vanderburgh Community Corrections once a quarter. A total of 98 individuals attended 52 hours of training.

Awareness and Education

National Homeless Memorial Day

In conjunction with the National Coalition for the Homeless and near the first day of winter, Aurora sponsors a local public memorial service annually in order to recognize individuals who have died while being homeless.

Trinity United Methodist Church has hosted this event since its local beginnings in 2000. 7 individuals were remembered in 2009. A total of 70 names are currently memorialized on display boards in Aurora's main office lobby.

Advocacy & Collaboration

Through serving on various local and state boards and councils, Aurora staff advocate for changes in social and economic systems that create barriers and contribute to the reality of homelessness in our community. Aurora participates in over 20 state-wide and community groups.

Destination Home: A Ten-Year Journey to End Homelessness in Evansville and Vanderburgh County

Destination: Home Resource Coordinator

In 2009, Aurora's Executive Director, Luzada Hayes, continued to serve as the Resource Coordinator for *Destination: Home--A Ten-Year Journey to End Homelessness in Evansville and Vanderburgh County*, providing staff support to the Commission on Homelessness, which oversees the plan's implementation.

Discharge Planning Coordinator

Aurora houses and provides supervision for Mindy Niehaus, the Coordinator hired by the Discharge Planning Coalition, a subgroup of the city-county Commission on Homelessness.

Education Specialist

Aurora provides support to promotion and awareness activities for Destination Home. Kat Isbell was our Education Specialist in 2009.

Vanderburgh Homeless Connect

Vanderburgh Homeless Connect was a one-day, one-stop event sponsored by community leaders and designed to provide housing service, quality of life services and hospitality in a convenient one-stop model directly to people experiencing or at-risk of homelessness.
